**MEALS ON WHEELS FOR GREATER HOUSTON  
ADDS NEW DELIVERY TRUCK TO FLEET**

*Halliburton donates truck to help reduce the number of more than 1100 seniors in Harris County on a waiting list to receive meals that could make the difference in whether they eat or go hungry.*

**HOUSTON** – (March 29, 2007)—Adding a brand new truck to its fleet brings Interfaith Ministries for Greater Houston one step closer to addressing an urgent need to provide hot, nutritious meals to more seniors in the Houston area. Currently, the organization’s Meals on Wheels for Greater Houston serves meals to more than 3,000 seniors in Harris County, Monday through Friday, 52 weeks a year. Despite the large number of seniors receiving help, there are more than 1100 seniors on a waiting list to receive meals. For most, it’s the only hot meal and the only companionship they receive during any given day.

“Thanks to Halliburton, this new truck will allow us to more efficiently serve more than 100 seniors in northeast Houston,” states David Roberts, IM Director of Senior Nutrition. “Beginning in June, this new truck and the route it serves, will take the place of three routes that were serviced by individual cars. Allowing us to distribute those cars to other areas of need.”

Cathy Mann, director of Communications for Halliburton, said: “Halliburton is committed to being a good corporate citizen and neighbor because doing so reflects our core values. Clearly there is an urgent need when there are 1100 senior citizens on a waiting list to receive meals and Halliburton is proud to donate a van to help Interfaith Ministries for Greater Houston fulfill this important need in our neighborhoods.”

Halliburton initially donated the truck to replace one that was stolen a month ago. Thankfully, the stolen truck was recovered and there weren't any seniors went without their nutrition for even a day.

Meals on Wheels for Greater Houston provides an essential service to the thousands of homebound seniors who are plagued by chronic illnesses that inhibit or deny their ability to obtain proper nutrition for themselves. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Administration on Aging found that 62 percent of seniors participating in meal programs receive half or more of their daily food intake from their home-delivered meals.
